1) Why it matters: Accelerating progress to SDG4

Working definition of micro-credentials

- 1. A record of **focused learning achievement** verifying what the learner knows, understands or can do.
- 2. Includes **assessment** based on clearly defined standards and is awarded by a trusted provider.
- 3. Has **standalone value** and may also contribute to or complement other microcredentials or macro-credentials, including through recognition of prior learning.
- 4. Meets the standards required by **relevant quality assurance**.

Gaps: In Asia-Pacific, only **15%** of necessary progress has been made at the midpoint of Agenda 2030 (<u>ESCAP</u>, 2023)







UNESCO qualifications passport for refugees and vulnerable migrants

According to <u>UNHCR</u>'s latest figures, among the world's more than 82 million refugees, only 5% of eligible youth are enrolled in higher education, whereas comparative figures for primary and secondary education are 68% and 34%, respectively (<u>UNESCO</u>).







Figure 1 The digital credentials ecosystem
