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INTRODUCTION

The conference provides an opportunity for policy-makers, stakeholders, experts and researchers from education and training, industry, and beyond, to be informed of the emerging role of microcredentials in supporting labour-market-related and employment-relevant education, training and learning.

The event will offer participants insights into the links between microcredentials and evolving qualifications systems, the perceived added value of microcredentials for end users, as well as creating a space for reflection and discussion of microcredentials' broader uptake and function. Building on research carried out by Cedefop in recent years, the conference complements the ongoing political discussion on tools and initiatives supporting people in their lifelong learning pathways as detailed in the July 2020 Skills Agenda, the Council Recommendation on vocational education and training (VET), the 2020 Osnabrück Declaration as well as the European Union Council Recommendation on a European approach to microcredentials.

OBJECTIVE AND AIMS OF THE CONFERENCE

The conference aims to initiate a discussion on the role microcredentials play in supporting labour-market-related and employment-relevant education, training and learning, including vocational education and training. It is an opportunity for Cedefop to share with participants the methodology and final findings of its study on microcredentials, and provides a space for reflection and discussion of future research on microcredentials. It will also be an opportunity for participants to exchange ideas and discuss the next steps of Cedefop's work in the field.

Presentations and discussions during the first day of the conference (22 June) will focus on the project, its final outcomes and the current political context; participants will have an opportunity to contribute actively in three breakout sessions. The second day (23 June) will offer a broader perspective on microcredentials, as they are increasingly being viewed as policy instruments for addressing several challenges (fast-changing labour market demands, digitalisation, ageing populations and needs for reskilling and upskilling, etc).

THURSDAY 22 JUNE

Bridging the abyss: from microcredentials to the labour market – added value for end users

Microcredentials have only recently gained prominence in European policy debates. They are increasingly considered as a new and more flexible way of recognising knowledge, skills and competences. By giving learners and employees the possibility to collect and combine smaller units of learning according to their specific needs, microcredentials have the potential to ease lifelong and life-wide learning. However, the portability and transferability of microcredentials, their currency and exchange value, largely depend on their visibility and perceived value by others, notably by education institutions and employers. Even though there are several examples of potentially large-scale efforts to address emerging skill needs through microcredentials – which could lead to innovations in VET – the provision of microcredentials still remains fragmented and without sufficient embedded user-centred services that could help learners and employers make informed decisions about the learning options available.

During the first day, after a brief introduction, Cedefop will present the main research questions and final findings of its study on microcredentials for labour market education and training. The study attempts to offer new knowledge on the characteristics of microcredentials, their added value for individual learners and employees, as well as their impact on existing qualifications systems.

On the first day there will also be three breakout sessions:

- **breakout session 1** will address the role microcredentials play in improving skills utilisation and career development;
- **breakout session 2** will address the added value of microcredentials for end users;
- **breakout session 3** will discuss how microcredentials can build stronger links between vocational education and workplace requirements.

FRIDAY 23 JUNE

Microcredentials untold: the European and international perspective

The second day of the workshop will offer participants an opportunity to discuss different issues related to microcredentials' existing use at European and international levels. Microcredentials are awarded by a diversity of stakeholders operating at different levels and institutional contexts. A discussion focusing on the extent to which digital credentialing in Europe and beyond is advancing, as well as on the global dimension of microcredentials, will be the focus of the day. Discussions will also aim at exploring whether microcredentials can **bridge the world of education and the world of work**. During the second day, leading international experts in 'microcredentialling' will present inspiring ideas on their current work and share their vision of what comes next.

WORKING METHODS

The conference will take place online (Zoom platform). Participants will attend presentations and will be able to participate both through standard Q&A sessions and through chat comments.

Both days will include plenary sessions. For the discussions of 22 June in the break-out sessions, participants will be able to choose a theme of interest for them.
