The conference is an opportunity for policy-makers, stakeholders, experts and researchers from education and training, industry and beyond, to discuss and understand the emerging roles of microcredentials in supporting labour-market-related and employment-relevant education, training and learning.

Building on research carried out by Cedefop in recent years, the conference complements the ongoing political discussion on tools and initiatives supporting people in their lifelong learning pathways established in the July 2020 Skills Agenda, the Council Recommendation on vocational education and training (VET) and the 2020 Osnabrück Declaration.

OBJECTIVE AND AIMS OF THE CONFERENCE

The conference aims to initiate a discussion on the characteristics and the potential roles that might be played by microcredentials in supporting labour-market-related and employment-relevant education, training and learning, including vocational education and training. It offers Cedefop an opportunity to share with participants the methodology and interim findings of its study on microcredentials, as well as a space for reflection and discussion of microcredentials' broader uptake and function.

Presentations and discussions during the first day of the conference (25 November) will focus on the project and its outcomes and will give participants an opportunity to participate actively in three breakout sessions. The second day (26 November) will take a broader perspective on microcredentials, as they are increasingly being viewed as independent building blocks in national and international skills strategies responding to several drivers (fast-changing labour markets demands, digitalisation, ageing populations, need for reskilling and upskilling, etc).

THURSDAY 25 NOVEMBER A CHANGING QUALIFICATIONS LANDSCAPE

Microcredentials are increasingly being viewed as a new and more flexible way of recognising knowledge, skills and competences. Giving learners and employees the possibility to collect and combine smaller units of learning according to their specific needs, microcredentials can act as building blocks facilitating lifelong and life-wide learning. However, it is not always clear whether microcredentials represent something genuinely new and innovative. Looking at the certification and qualification landscape in general, task- and competence-oriented certificates - often linked to shorter learning experiences - already play an important role in many parts of the labour market (for example those offered by sectors, private companies, international organisations and public bodies).

Recent research carried out on microcredentials has focused on their increasing use in higher, academic education. While this perspective is important and relevant, Cedefop's study aims to examine their potential role in vocational and professional education and training, placing emphasis on their role outside formal education and training, notably in upskilling and re-skilling in companies and labour market sectors.

Following a brief introduction, there will be a presentation of the main research questions and interim findings of Cedefop's study on microcredentials by the project leaders. The study aims to offer new knowledge on the characteristics of microcredentials, their added value to individual learners and employees, as well as their impact on existing qualifications and recognition systems.

The first day will also include three break-out sessions: break-out session 1 will address the role of microcredentials in EU labour-market-

- related education and training. It will question whether microcredentials are something genuinely new or if they are just a new name for existing qualifications and certificates; break-out session 2 will look into the ways microcredentials interact with existing
- qualification and certification systems already serving enterprises, sectors and technology areas, by comparing them to modularisation and partial qualifications; break-out session 3 will explore the issue of trust and added value of microcredentials for end-users, notably individual learners and employers.

AND INTERNATIONAL LEVELS The second day of the conference will offer participants an opportunity to discuss various issues related to microcredentials' existing and potential use at a national, European and

international levels. Microcredentials are awarded by a diversity of stakeholders operating at different levels and institutional contexts. Many countries operate with modularised VET systems, in which numerous smaller learning units can be flexibly combined and accumulated to meet the needs of individuals and employers better. Several European countries have also opened up their national qualifications frameworks (NQFs) to include private, international and/or non-formal qualifications and certificates. Validation of learning outcomes acquired in non-formal and informal learning facilitates upskilling and reskilling, leading not only to full qualifications, but also to microcredentials or partial qualifications. It also acts as a bridge between different fields, which is necessary for developing a green and sustainable economy. A discussion focusing on these issues, as well as on the extent to which international organisations and bodies issuing microcredentials could potentially challenge the traditional national governance of qualifications and credentials systems, will be the focus of the second day. Discussions will also explore whether microcredentials are actually changing the progression in learning more broadly. **WORKING METHODS**
