

## ReferNet Plenary Meeting 2024 Session 8. Thematic round tables on EU VET priorities Guidelines to participants 29 February 2024, 10:15 – 13:00 (EET)

Thematic round tables 2024 give you an opportunity to discuss the key achievements and challenges your countries face on the way towards EU VET priorities as set in the <u>Council</u> <u>Recommendation on VET</u> and the <u>Osnabrück Declaration</u>. It may also be useful for you to finalise the thematic perspectives you are now working on (Deliverable 3a).

The round table discussions will be organised in three timeslots so you will be able to contribute to discussions on at least three priorities.

- > actively participate in the discussion;
- > reflect on the issues raised and share examples from their countries.
